- 1. Dress appropriately for the conditions in which you will be working. Bear in mind the requirements of PPE when working with insulation or drywall/mud dust.
- 2. In extremely hot temperatures consider starting work earlier in the morning and working in the evenings to avoid the hottest part of the day.
- 3. Ensure adequate ventilation in the house including opening windows and doors. Ensure you stay well hydrated with water.
- 4. Monitor for signs of heat stroke including, rapid pulse, hot and flushed skin, headaches, fatigue, dizziness, nausea, vomiting and unconsciousness.
- 5. If heatstroke is suspected, stop work immediately, move the affected worker to a cool shaded place and seek immediate first aid or medical assistance.
- 6. If the external temperature is extremely cold, no sub trade shall be forced to work in a house without heat. The heat should increase the inside air temperature significantly.
- 7. In cold environments, monitor for mild signs of hypothermia including shivering, slurred speech, a person may be withdrawn or disinterested.
- 8. If hypothermia is suspected, stop work immediately and obtain immediate first aid or medical assistance.
- 9. If temperatures dip below -25 degrees Celsius, allow your vehicle to warm up for a minimum of 5 minutes so it will run more easily.
- 10. DO NOT SUPPLY YOUR OWN HEAT unless authorized by immediate Supervisor.
